#### Summary of report:

To determine an application for a new Premises Licence at **Vinos Pizzeria and Grill, 7 Fore Street, Ivybridge, PL21 9AB,** in accordance with Section 18 of the Licensing Act 2003.

#### **Financial implications:**

There are no direct financial implications to the Council from this Report.

#### **RECOMMENDATIONS:**

That the Sub-Committee consider the application for a new Premises Licence and make a determination in respect of this application, namely to:

- i grant the application as submitted, subject to any Mandatory Conditions required;
- ii modify the conditions of the licence;
- iii exclude any of the licensable activities to which the application relates;
- iv refuse to specify a person in the licence as the premises supervisor;
- v reject the application

in line with the licensing objectives (Section 4) contained within the Licensing Act 2003.

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#### 1. BACKGROUND

- 1.1 The Licensing Authority received an application for a new premises licence on 25 July 2013 from Mr Yilmaz Bali for Vinos Pizzeria and Grill, 7 Fore Street, Ivybridge, PL21 9AB. A copy of the application is attached (Appendix 'A').
- 1.2 The application is for the provision of late night refreshment Sunday to Thursday from 11pm to midnight and Friday and Saturday from 11pm to 1.30am. The provision of late night refreshment is the sale of hot food and hot drinks between 11pm and 5am.
- 1.3 The Licensing Department received six representations in respect of this application; these can be found in **Appendix 'B'**. We received representations from Ivybridge Town Council, an Ivybridge Town Councillor, from Environmental Health, from the Police and from two District Councillors. The objections mainly relate to concerns about the potential for public nuisance and disorder. Reasons given for these concerns directly relate to the late hours of trading and the nature of the business as a takeaway. It has been noted that the clientele using the premises after 11pm are likely to be inebriated, thus creating a greater potential for public disorder. It has been suggested that should the premises trade after 11pm, there should be provisions in place to help prevent and control possible incidents.
- 1.4 Although there are other takeaway premises located in Fore Street, lvybridge, it has been highlighted by the Police representation that these do not operate throughout their licensed hours due to work and consultation between the proprietors, the Police and lvybridge Town Council. The Police have described hot food takeaways in locations situated near to public houses as 'Hot Spots' for trouble, where incidents of disorder are caused by groups of drunken individuals congregating in one area to buy and consume food.
- 1.5 Most of the representations highlight the likelihood of a noise nuisance being caused by customers congregating in the area and talking or shouting to one another and also an increase in litter from wrappers, packaging and food. It has been noted that although the premises is located in the town centre, there are many residents that live in the vicinity that may be affected.
- 1.6 Both the Police and the Environmental Health Officer have included requests for conditions relating to the provision of CCTV and provision of SIA trained door supervisors, should the application for the late night refreshment licence be granted. The Environmental Health Officer has also requested that conditions to minimise the potential nuisance from waste be included on the licence if granted.
- 1.7 It has not been possible for the Licensing Department to mediate with all parties; therefore a satisfactory conclusion has not been possible.

#### 2. ISSUES FOR CONSIDERATION

- 2.1 As mentioned above, six representations have been received from: two District Councillors, Ivybridge Town Council, an Ivybridge Town Councillor, Environmental Health and the Police.
- 2.2 Issues raised in the representations relate to the potential for increased crime and disorder and public nuisance should the late night refreshment licence be granted.
- 2.3 To give a better idea of the situation of the premises, a location map and photographs of the takeaway can be found in **Appendix 'C'**.
- 2.4 The Sub Committee will now need to consider this application.

- 3.8 Primary Care Trust/Local Health Boards, Devon Drug and Alcohol Action Team No representations have been received.

#### 4. RELEVANT LICENSING POLICY CONSIDERATIONS

#### Licensing Objectives

- 4.1 Section 2.1 of the Policy states: The Licensing Authority has a duty under the Act to carry out its licensing functions with a view to promoting the four licensing objectives. (These objectives are the only matters to be taken into account in determining the application and any conditions attached must be necessary to achieve the licensing objectives).
- 4.2 Section 2.2 of the Policy states: A licence will only be granted where the Licensing Authority is satisfied that these objectives have been met.
- 4.3 Section 2.3 of the Policy lists the kind of measures the Licensing Authority will be expecting to see taken into account to promote the objectives.

#### Conditions

- 4.4 Sections 2.5 & 2.6 of the Policy sets out additional legislation, strategies, policies and guidance to which the Licensing Authority will have regard. Section 4 of the policy sets out what the Sub-Committee should consider before imposing conditions on a licence.
- 4.5 The Guidance issued under Section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003 which was revised and re-published in June 2013 state:
- 4.6 The Licensing Authority may not impose conditions unless its discretion has been engaged following receipt of relevant representations and it is satisfied as a result of a hearing (unless all parties agree a hearing is not necessary) that is appropriate to impose conditions to promote one or more of the four licensing objectives (paragraph 10.8 of the guidance).
- 4.7 Where applications have given rise to representations, any appropriate conditions should normally focus on the most sensitive periods. In certain circumstances, conditions relating to noise immediately surrounding the premises may also prove appropriate to address any disturbance anticipated as customers enter and leave (paragraph 2.22 of guidance).

#### **Licensing Hours**

4.8 Section 6.1 & 6.2 of the Policy states: The Licensing Authority will deal with the issue of licensing hours on the individual merits of each application. When the Authority's discretion is engaged, consideration will be given to the individual merits of an application but the presumption will be to grant the hours requested unless there are objections to those hours raised by Responsible Authorities or other persons on the basis of the licensing objectives. However, when dealing with licensing hours beyond midnight it is more likely that relevant representations will be made unless there are higher standards of control within operating schedules to promote the licensing objectives, especially for premises which are situated near residential areas or in areas where anti-social disorder takes place.

There is no presumption within the legislation for longer opening hours.

- 4.9 Section 6.5 of the Policy states: The terminal hours will normally be approved where the Applicant can show that the proposal would not adversely affect the licensing objectives unless, after hearing relevant representation the Licensing Authority believe it necessary, proportionate and reasonable to restrict the hours required. The Licensing Authority may set an earlier terminal hour where it considers this is appropriate to the nature of the activities and the amenity of the area.
- 4.10 Paragraph 10.13 of Guidance issued under Section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003 states: shops, stores and supermarkets should normally be free to provide sales of alcohol for consumption off the premises at any times when the retail outlet is open for shopping unless there are good reasons, based on the licensing objectives, for restricting those hours

#### Children

- 4.11 Section 7.1 of the Policy states: The Licensing Authority recognises the great variety of premises for which licences may be sought. These will include theatres, cinemas, restaurants, pubs, nightclubs, cafes, takeaways, community halls and schools. Access by children to all types of premises will not be limited unless it is considered necessary to do so in order to protect them from harm.
- 4.12 Section 7.2 of the Policy states: When deciding whether or not to limit access to children the Licensing Authority will judge each application on its own individual merits. Examples which may give rise to concern and warrant restrictions in the operating schedule include premises: -
  - where entertainment of an adult or sexual nature is provided
  - where there is a strong element of gambling taking place
  - with a known association with drug taking or dealing
  - where there have been convictions of the current management for serving alcohol to minors

- with a reputation for allowing underage drinking
- where the supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises is exclusive or primary purpose of the services provided at the premises.

#### 5. LEGAL IMPLICATIONS

- 5.1 As there have been relevant representations in respect of this application which have not been resolved, this hearing must be held. (Relevant representations are about the likely effect of the grant of the application on the promotion of the licensing objectives, responsible authorities or any other person). The sub-committee must disregard any information or evidence not relevant to the licensing objectives.
- 5.2 The sub-committee must consider this application in accordance with Section 4 of the Licensing Act 2003, which requires that licensing functions must be carried out with a view to promoting the four licensing objectives. The Licensing Authority must also have regard to its own licensing policy and the Secretary of State's guidance, but may depart from both if it has good reason to do so. Those reasons should be stated.
- 5.3 The Act requires (Section 18) that in dealing with a new application, the committee takes any of the following steps which are necessary for the promotion of the licensing objectives:
  - (a) To grant the Licence subject to:-

i any Mandatory Conditions required;

ii modifying the conditions which have been specified in the operating schedule;

- (b) to exclude any of the licensable activities to which the application relates;
- (c) to refuse to specify a person in the licence as the premises supervisor;
- (d) to reject the application

The Sub-Committee must give its reasons for its decision to take any of these steps. Similarly, if the application is rejected, the Sub-Committee must give its reasons.

- 5.4 The committee will need to consider the hours of operation proposed, the effectiveness of the operating schedule proposed by the applicant, the representations received, the location of the premises in relation to residential properties, the history of the management of the premises, the evidence produced of any problems in the past, and the likely impact of any extension of hours and activities, public transport, taxi availability, the right the applicant has to operate a business and balancing the rights of residents to the quiet enjoyment and privacy of family life. That South Hams relies on tourism, with the population in the district doubling in the Summer months with holidaymakers both from this country and international visitors who are, in the main, families with young children and retired people the very segment of society who would perhaps be deterred by anti-social behaviour. These issues, and any other relevant ones, may be explored at the hearing in so far as it reflects the four licensing objectives.
  - 5.5 If the Sub-Committee rejects the application, or modifies the conditions of the licence, the applicant or any person who made relevant representation in relation to the application may appeal within 21 days of notification of the decision to the Magistrates' Court. Those making relevant representations may also appeal if they believe that the licence should not have been varied, or that, when varying the licence, the Licensing Authority ought not to have modified the conditions, or ought to have modified them in a different way. The Magistrates' Court may dismiss the appeal, or substitute its own decision, or send back the case to the Licensing Authority with directions as to how the case is to be dealt with. The Magistrates' Court may make any costs order it thinks fit.
  - 5.6 If extended hours/licensable activities are granted, the Licensing Act contains review provisions which enable a responsible authority or any other person to apply to this Licensing Authority for a review of the licence. A hearing follows which enables the sub-committee to use the normal powers at a hearing (set out above) but also to suspend the licence for a period of up to three months or to revoke it.



I have no hesitation in objecting on the grounds of potential public nuisance and public disorder given that Fore St has he Old Smithy and Exchange public houses

with the Duke of Cornwall, The Imperial, Bridge Inn and the Sportsmans all within two hundred yards. The potential for alcohol related trouble in Fore St is already significant. There is no intended negative reflection on the management of these establishments as they are in the vast majority ofcases very good landlords and proactive at minimising problems. They cannot howver exercise toal control off of their premises.

That leads me to the large number of take aways in Fore St and I am not aware that the other food related businesses have applied for any variation beyond 11pm.

There has been negative publicity over the years in relation to litter arising from takeaways in Fore St and in general there has been some improvement which we would not wish to see reversed.

it is recognised that Fore St is a hot spot for problems and we have recently seen the introduction of Street Pastors to assist in resolving issues it would therefore be totally inexplicable and a retrograde step to permit opening times of these premises beyond the current timings. I would recommend outright refusal or the good work already being applied to ease problems will be totally negated.

The Police Neighbourhood Lead Sgt.John Livingstone has highlighted his concerns below in response to a request from the Town Council. Whilst he has mentioned mitigation measures as a fall back it is clear that he sees any extension in a very negative light and very detrimental.

Dear Lesley

Thank you for your Email in relation to the application for a new premises licence to sell hot food after 2300hrs on Fore St. As you will be aware the other two outlets that sell hot food on Fore street do not trade after 2300hrs even although they technically could by the terms of their licence, this is due to years of work and consultation between the proprietors, licensing, the council and the police to come to agreements as to what is the best balance to serve the needs of the community while still allowing traders to make a profit which is essential especially in today's financial climate.

From a policing perspective any commercial outlet that supplies hot food in the area where public houses are, will always be a Hot Spot for trouble at closing time, where groups of drinkers / revellers will congregate at this time as it is human nature to want food to eat after a night of consuming alcohol. My concerns with this especially in a small quite town like lybridge is all the associated



problems that go along with groups of drunken individuals congregating in one area to buy and consume food in an area that is not solely a commercial part of the town but also has residents living above or in close proximity, who are all going to be effected by this decision.

I believe the council will have to think long and hard about what restrictions they put on this licence application as any premises selling hot food in Fore St, after 2300hrs will have groups of individuals gathering in the area waiting for and consuming food in that area, people who have spent the night drinking alcohol will come into contact with others who have been doing the same at different locations which can lead to confrontations, fights and anti social behaviour (ASB).

There is also the noise levels and litter situation to considers as while some people may eat their hot food on the way home, many more will tend to consume any bought food in the vicinity of the premises where the food was purchased and a large percentage of those people will disregard any wrappers, packaging and excess food where they are sat or stood.

Another consideration is the noise levels of people who have been drinking, who then decide to socialize in the street while eating their take away with other people who have been drinking will tend to be loud and boisterous at best, or aggressive and violent at worst.

As a police officer responsible for the safety of the community within the town of lvybridge, I can see little or no benefit to the general community by supporting this application and would request that if a licence is granted that the new proprietors guarantee to install good quality CCTV system covering both the inside and outside of the premises to help with the investigation into instances of ASB, crimes or incidents associated with the premises and the surrounding area which I believe will increase if the application is granted.

To this I would add that not only is Fore Street itself a partially residential area but there are already issues of noise, nuisance and litter in surrounding streets such as Costly Street and Exeter Road beyond and elsewhere in the town. A take-away, staying open till these hours can only increase the likelihood of nuisance late at night. I do appreciate the value of the evening economy to the prosperity of the town but this is not an urban club-land but a very largely residential community and I cannot see, given the potential problems (as also identified by Sgt Livingstone), of the need to extending into the early hours of the morning – given that a 1.30 closure potentially means at least 2am – 2.30 clearance.

Thank you for your notification of the licensing application below, there is concerns that allowing this premises to open until the early hours of the morning will cause noise problems due to people milling around the premises. I also note that the licensed premises in the area that also open late into the evening have conditions applied to their licences requiring measures to minimise the potential for noise and public disorder, I would therefore suggest that the authority consider imposing the following conditions unless the applicant agrees to accept them;

- Between the hours of 23:00 01:30 the licensee shall ensure that the line is controlled by the use of door
  premises supervisors, whose role it will be to ensure that patrons are quiet and do not cause a nuisance to the
  nearby properties.
- Prior to the licensee using this licence hereby approved the licensee shall install a suitably cited CCTV system which will monitor and record both the inside of the shop and the queuing public.

Due to the potential for waste arising from the customers which could cause a public nuisance I believe it would also be appropriate to place conditions on the licence to minimise the potential nuisance from waste, suitable conditions could be:-

A suitable and secure waste container must be supplied by the licence holder to be positioned immediately outside the premises and that such containers must be taken in at closing time and must be kept in reasonable condition in line with its designed usage.

Members of staff must ensure that immediately outside the premises, all litter and waste food be collected and disposed of and that regular checks must be conducted by the staff to enable this to be done and the facilities for depositing litter and the collection of litter generated by patrons must be maintained.

At close of business, all litter attributable to the business which is in the vicinity of the premises must be removed.

### Dear Naomi

Following receipt of the information about the application for 7 Fore Street, I advised the local central ward Councillors and contacted the local police. I have seen the response from ClIr Saltern which properly reflected the concerns of the police and explained in detail the reasons for rejecting the extension of the licence. This approach had the support of the three ward Town Councillors, Bowden, Dredge and Wilson. However I considered that as this was a matter that should be ratified by a formal Town Council committee because of the importance, I included it on the only meeting held of the Council in August. This happens to be the Planning Committee and having now checked the terms of reference it is not specifically in their remit to consider licensing, so it may be considered that the views, whilst of interest, should not therefore carry any weight in the consultation. However I am forwarding these to you (reproduced below) and copying to the ward Councillors in case they wish to reinforce their objections to you directly.

As a Town Council we have quarterly meetings with the police and know that the work done by them, with the support of the Street Pastors, on Friday and Saturdays, has helped over the recent period to diminish the incidents of anti social behaviour on Fridays. Whilst funding has been found to provide a police presence in the Ivybridge area on Friday and Saturday nights this cannot be assured for the future and a regular attendance in Fore Street would therefore create capacity problems for the rest of the policing area. It would be disappointing for the town if this escalated and the policing group knows that this is all too probable if people are encouraged to stay in Fore Street beyond 11pm and the difficulties this will create for the police. As the street lighting in Ivybridge is turned off (except in Fore Street and the Exeter Road/Western Road) after 12.30am it could create problems for those returning to the residential areas creating more noise and disturbance. I also understand that the public toilets are closed by this time and in the past the problem of people urinating in the side alleyways on Fore Street has been a concern, which could escalate once again. These are all issues which have concerned this Council in the past.

## Views of the Planning Committee:

**"NEW PREMISES LICENCE – 7 FORE STREET, IVYBRIDGE:** The committee considered the application for provision of late night refreshment Sunday to Thursday from 11pm to midnight and Friday and Saturday from 11pm to 1.30am (indoors and outdoors) (copy previously circulated).

Cllr Khong advised the meeting that letters of objection had been submitted to South Hams District Council from the police and District Cllr Mike Saltern. Cllr Bowden suggested that the application be rejected as it would create a precedent with other fast food outlets and would encourage litter and anti-social behaviour, and that a uniform policy be retained as others would follow and Fore Street was also a residential area.



Cllr Mrs Sylvia Rutley disagreed as she was in favour of an extension to the licence to midnight on a Friday and Saturday as in her experience when younger it was natural to go for something to eat after visiting the pub. Cllr Mrs Silsbury supported Cllr Rutley's statement and Cllr Butcher also agreed adding that the when the pubs close all the fast food outlets are shut precluding people from being able to purchase fast food.

Cllr Mrs Silsbury further added that it would be difficult to impose a restriction when the other outlets already have licences for later than 11pm, although the committee did question the viability of remaining open after 11pm, and suggested that this is the reason why the other outlets may not choose to stay open beyond 11pm.

The committee were in agreement that 1.30am was too late as Fore Street is a residential area, and that it be restricted to 11pm weekdays and 12 midnight on a Friday and Saturday.

It was **RESOLVED** to support the extension, but only on Friday and Saturday night from 11pm to midnight and no extension beyond 11pm be permitted from Sunday to Thursday."

### Dear Sir/Madam

#### Re: Vinos Pizzeria and Grill, lvybridge

I write to advise you that there are Police representations to the above application. The grounds for representation are set out below.

### **Crime and Disorder**

The police view is that to allow the licence to be granted as applied for will create incidents of crime and disorder late at night. By consultation and hard work the other late night food takeaways are all shut by 2300hrs in lvybridge. This has kept incidents of violence to a minimum.

From a policing perspective any commercial outlet that supplies hot food in an area where public houses are situated will always be a 'Hot Spot' for trouble at closing time due to groups of drinkers/revellers congregating at this time to eat after a night of consuming alcohol. Police concerns are that in a small town like lvybridge there will be a number of associated problems that go along with groups of drunken individuals congregating in one area to buy and consume food. This will take place in an area that is not solely a commercial part of the town, but has residents living above or in close proximity who are all going to be put at risk of crime and disorder if this licence is granted.

### Public Nuisance

Opening as late as applied for will, even with the best control measures, create noise and disturbance for neighbours. Noise levels and litter will increase in the area as,

while some people may eat their hot food on the way home, many more will tend to consume any bought food in the vicinity of the premises where the food was purchased and a large percentage of those people will disregard any wrappers, packaging and excess food where they are sat or stood.

### Public Safety

It is the police experience of late night food outlets that the numbers of customers arriving after having consumed alcohol leads to incidents of disorder and assault. The risk of assault increases for customers and staff in particular if there is a language barrier.

It is the police view that the premises could serve food to 2300hrs each day without issue. If the committee is minded to grant a later licence then the following conditions would be needed to prevent breaches of the licensing objectives, to reduce disturbance to residents and reduce the risk of assault on customers.

### General

All staff shall be trained in personal and social responsibilities, with particular emphasis on the safety and well being of customers, other members of staff and local residents.

### The Prevention of Crime and Disorder

A CCTV system shall be installed on the premises to fit the following requirements:

- 1. The system must have cameras situated which identify persons entering and leaving the premises (100% monitor size).
- 2. No camera within the system will produce an image which is not capable of detecting the actions of subject (10% monitor size).
- 3. Images will be retained for a minimum of fourteen days.
- 4. The hard drive will be capable of retaining data for fourteen days and the frame rate will not be less than five frames per second.
- 5. When a known incident has taken place a backup copy should be made.
- 6. Cameras must be positioned to capture the face so that persons may be identified by their facial features.
- 7. Areas which are lit the must have an evenness of light. Glare and dark areas must be avoided.
- 8. The CCTV system will record time and date on the image, this must be accurate.
- 9. The system must be capable of downloading recorded images in a format, which the Police can use and read.
- 10. CCTV images are personal data and must be kept secure. Data images must only be released to authorised bodies including the Police/Council Officers, for the prevention and detection of crime.

- 11. Management Practices All staff must be trained in the use of equipment and the appropriate legislation. (Data Protection Act RIPA).
- 12. CCTV is to be provided at the time of a Police Officer's request.
- 13. The system must be regularly checked to ensure it is in full working order, any defects must be rectified within 14 days. The Police and South Hams Council are to be notified of all defects.
- 14. Entrances, waiting areas and exits of the premises, together with the pavement area, outside the premises must have CCTV coverage.
- 15. The CCTV must be fully operational when the premises are open to members of the public.

### Public Safety

When the premises are open for the sale of hot food after 2300hrs an SIA qualified doorperson shall be employed from 2200hrs until the premises close to the public.

### Public Nuisance

The premises will provide containers for any discarded packaging or food and will undertake to collect any discarded packaging or food for a distance of 100 metres in any direction from the premises once the premises close.



## LSC.05/13 DECLARATIONS OF INTEREST

Members were invited to declare any interests in the items of business to be considered during the course of the meeting but none were made.

# LSC.06/13 TO DETERMINE AN APPLICATION FOR A NEW PREMISES LICENCE AT VINOS PIZZERIA AND GRILL, 7 FORE STREET, IVYBRIDGE, PL21 9AB, IN ACCORDANCE WITH SECTION 18 OF THE LICENSING ACT 2003

## 1. Licensing Officer's Report

The Licensing Officer introduced the report to the Sub-Committee and advised that the application was for a new premises licence as set out in the agenda papers. A number of representations had been received and further information had been submitted by the Applicant.

# 2. Address by the Applicant

The Applicant began by advising the Sub Committee that no objections had been received from residents. He explained that he was here to politely ask for the opening hours of his establishment to be extended as set out in his application. He also advised that the opening hours in his application were in line with the opening hours set out in licences granted to surrounding premises. Whilst the opening hours were later than he intended to be open, he thought they were suitable hours because they were in line with others in the vicinity.

The Applicant raised concerns in relation to the requirements of the Police Authority as set out in their representation, as they were requesting that he employ door staff from 10.00pm. He felt that this was unfair and that perhaps door staff from 11.00pm would be more appropriate. In terms of the request for CCTV he already had that fitted and would ensure the required technology was in place. He noted the comments about litter, and would ensure there would not be litter outside his premises but he could not be held responsible for litter dropped further down the street. He also noted their comments that the risk of assault increases if there is a language barrier. He intended to employ excellent staff to reduce the need for queuing which could often be the trigger for bad behaviour. He understood the issues raised, but wanted the same conditions which had been applied to other businesses surrounding him, and he was disappointed that nobody had sat down with him to discuss the issues. He also felt it was unfair to raise issues of public safety as an objection to his licence, when that did not apply to others.

## 3. Address by the Police Authority representatives

Mr Olver advised the committee that any request for door staff would commence from 11.00pm. The comments relating to language barriers were based on experience at other premises. The Police Authority's view was that granting this licence would lead to problems, i.e. there was a danger of people leaving local clubs or coming back from Plymouth attending the premises in a drunken state; there was the issue of getting people to disperse from the location and there was the issue of assaults on others/staff.

PC Perry advised that he was the Beat Manager for Ivybridge Town. He was able to advise the Committee that although neighbouring premises held licences that enabled them to be open until 1.30am, they did in fact close at 11.00pm or midnight during the week. There was then no reason for people leaving the public houses to loiter in the main street. The Ivybridge Fish Bar opened until 1.30am but this led to people congregating in the middle of town and sporadic instances of criminal damage.

Mr Olver advised the committee that he appreciated that others had a late licence, but they did not use it. If the Committee was minded to grant the licence then door staff would be requested after 11.00pm and it must be made clear that closing time should be when the doors closed, and not when the last food order was taken. The CCTV system should include an audible element as evidence of verbal exchanges would be useful evidence if a case should go to Court. Finally, clarification would be needed in relation to the Bank Holidays. **Page 50** 

# 4. Address by the District Council Ward Members

Cllr Saltern began by advising the Committee that councillors were entitled to take into account the views of their community and in this case whilst individuals had not responded they had allowed their local councillors to do this on their behalf. He stated that the Applicant was right to raise the issue of inequality however it was likely that the other licences had been granted prior to the changes to the Licensing Act. There was a history to Fore Street in Ivybridge that went back many years and there were numerous problems in relation to public disorder and litter. There were nearly 100 residents in and around Fore Street who were impacted by late night noise disturbance and litter. The lvybridge Fish Bar did not open as late as it could, as an agreement had been reached with the Police Authority. This agreement would be undermined if this licence were to be granted. In relation to the requirement for CCTV, this covered the inside of the premises but not the wider area. Measures put in place such as street pastors would be thwarted. Tremendous efforts had been made working in partnership with the Police to try and solve the issues in Fore Street with the cooperation of owners who have not opened to the full extent of their hours. We would hope to continue in that way.

Cllr Barber continued by advising the Committee that he wanted to support businesses but was concerned about the impact of businesses being open late at night. Already there were issues of litter being dropped along Exeter Street. Whilst he was not so concerned about the need for a doorman his concern was the extended times that would lead to people hanging around the premises and causing a disturbance. His concerns were raised both as a resident and a councillor.

# 5. Address by the lvybridge Town Council Representative

Cllr Dredge of Ivybridge Town Council stated that he was speaking both as a councillor and as a member of the Policing Matters Committee. He accepted that some of the experiences previously mentioned related to Plymouth however he was well aware that when people congregate in fast food premises after drinking, incidents arose that often triggered violent exchanges.

Many comments had been made about CCTV, however for CCTV to be effective it had to be of suitable quality. As a resident of lvybridge he was most concerned to see litter strewn around.

In summary, his objections centred around litter and the safety of the general public.

## 6. Sub-Committee's Deliberations

The Sub-Committee discussed the application during which clarification was sought in respect of the agreement that had been mentioned whereby neighbouring premises did not open to the full extent of their hours. The Business Support Manager advised that providing licensing objectives were met there would be no need to seek changes to existing licences. The agreement stated that premises would open until 11.00pm during the week and until 12 midnight on Friday and Saturday nights. Work was also ongoing with the street pastors to prevent anti-social behaviour.

The Chairman asked the Applicant if he had any further points to make and the Applicant stated that the public safety concerns related to alcohol but that he was selling food. All the objections raised applied equally to the Ivybridge Fish Bar and to Ali Babas who were able to be open late, and he wanted to be treated equally. He was happy not to open past 1.00am. If drunk people caused trouble then the Police were not doing their job to monitor licensed premises.

(At this point, the meeting was adjourned to enable the Sub-Committee, in the presence of the Council Solicitor, to determine this application).

The Chairman reconvened the Sub-Committee and advised that the Members wanted to ensure fairness. He asked for clarity from the Police in relation to the closing times by agreement of Ali Babas and Ivybridge Fish Bar. PC Perry responded that the premises were generally closed by 11.00pm but he did not have specific information with him and he did not have a copy of the agreement to hand. The Business Support Manager added that the Ivybridge Fish Bar did not want to open late and was generally closed by 11.00pm. The Applicant was of the view that Ali Babas opened until 12 midnight on Fridays and Saturdays but that the Ivybridge Fish Bar did not open beyond 11.00pm.

(At this point, the meeting was again adjourned to enable the Sub-Committee, in the presence of the Council Solicitor, to determine this application).

### 7. The Decision

The Sub Committee reconvened and the Chairman then proceeded to announce the decision as follows:

"We have considered the application for a new premises licence. We have considered the Statement of Licensing Policy, the government guidance and our obligations that relate to the promotion of the licensing objectives. We have read carefully the written representations from parties not present today and have read carefully representations received from parties present plus additional statements from persons here today.

It is our decision to grant this application subject to the following changes being incorporated into the operating schedule. We have determined the changes to be Appropriate to achieve the licensing objectives and to ensure fairness between the local businesses:-

- Sunday to Thursday opening hours until 11.00pm
- Friday and Saturday opening hours until 12 midnight
- New Years Eve opening until 1.00am on New Year's Day
- Bank Holidays opening hours as per Friday and Saturday.

Full decisions and reasons will be forwarded by post within the next five working days.

It is our decision therefore to grant this application with conditions as set out in the License Schedule and subject to the amendments made.
