Recommendations:

That the Sub-Committee consider the application for a variation to the Premises Licence and make determinations in respect of this application, namely:

- (a) to modify the conditions of the licence;
- (b) to reject the whole or part of the application;

and for this purpose the conditions of the licence are modified if any of them is altered or omitted or any new condition is added.

The decision must be in line with the licensing objectives contained within the Licensing Act 2003.

1. Executive summary

- 1.1 The purpose of the Licensing Sub-Committee meeting is to determine an application for a variation to the Premises Licence at **The Exchange, 1 Fore Street, Ivybridge, PL21 9AB** in accordance with Section 35 of the Licensing Act 2003.
- 1.2 The Licensing Department have received five representations in objection to the application and therefore the application must be determined by the Licensing Sub-Committee.

2. Background

- 2.1 The Licensing Authority received an application from The Craft Union Pub Company Ltd to vary their premises licence on 14 June 2024. The application is to:
 - Extend the timings for indoor sporting events to:
 - Sunday to Thursday: 08:00 00:00
 - Friday and Saturday: 08:00 01:00
 - Extend the timings for live music, recorded music and the performance of dance (indoors) to:
 - Sunday to Thursday: 10:00 00:00
 - Friday and Saturday: 10:00 01:00
 - Include the provision of late night refreshment (indoors):
 - Sunday to Thursday: 23:00 00:00
 - Friday and Saturday: 23:00 01:00
 - Extend the timings for supply of alcohol for consumption on and off the premises:
 - Sunday to Thursday: 09:00 00:00
 - Friday and Saturday: 09:00 01:00
 - Extend opening hours:
 - Sunday to Thursday: 08:00 00:30
 - Friday and Saturday: 08:00 01:30
- 2.2 It is requested that all licensable activities (and opening hours) end one hour later during the following non-standard timings: Friday, Saturday and Sunday preceding a Bank Holiday Monday; Maundy Thursday; Halloween; St. Patrick's Day; Christmas Eve; Christmas Day.
- 2.3 In addition, it is requested that on New Year's Eve the premises may stay open and allow all licensable activities from the end of permitted hours on New Year's Eve to the start of permitted hours on the following day.
- 2.4 The application also includes the following request in relation to international sporting fixtures:
 - The premises shall be allowed to operate for the sale/supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises during live televised major international sporting fixtures (i.e. nonleague tournaments such as Football/Rugby/Cricket World

Cups, Football Euros and The Superbowl) for 1hr preceding until 1hr post the relevant fixture where the live broadcast is outside of the times of the licence.

- 2.5 A copy of the application form is attached at **Appendix A**.
- 2.6 The premises is currently licensed for the following:
 - Indoor sporting events:
 - Monday to Sunday: 19:00 00:00
 - Live music, recorded music and the performance of dance (indoors):
 - Monday to Sunday: 10:00 00:00
 - Christmas Eve: 10:00 01:00
 - New Year's Eve: 10:00 02:00
 - Supply of alcohol for consumption on and off the premises:
 - Monday to Sunday: 10:00 23:30
 - Christmas Eve: 10:00 01:00
 - New Year's Eve: 10:00 01:30
 - Opening hours:
 - Monday to Sunday: 10:00 00:00
 - Christmas Eve: 08:00 01:30
 - New Year's Eve: 10:00 02:00
- 2.7 A copy of the current premises licence and licence plan is at Appendix B. This includes all the conditions currently on the licence and which will remain on there should the application be granted.
- 2.8 The premises is a pub located in the town centre of Ivybridge, close to other businesses and to residential properties. A plan showing the location of the premises is at **Appendix C**. The premises consists of a pub building with a balcony at the rear and an outside seating area to the side.
- 2.9 The pub previously closed at 01:30 on Friday and Saturdays and 00:30 on other days until June 2021, when a minor variation application was received to bring back the hours for licensable activities and closing times as per the current licence. The reason for the application was to amend the condition relating to the provision of door staff to make it less restrictive and was approved in liaison with Devon and Cornwall Police.
- 2.10 In December 2023 another minor variation application was received to update all the conditions on the premises licence. This application was submitted following liaison with the police and included the addition of a more restrictive condition relating to the provision of door staff. The application brought back the previous requirement for door supervisors to be employed between 20:30 until close on a Friday and Saturday evening, as well as the additional requirement for door supervisors to be employed on other occasions where necessary, following a risk assessment.

- 2.11 This application is seeking a return to the previous later hours during which the premises operated prior to June 2021.
- 2.12 During the consultation period, five relevant representations were received in objection to the application. Copies of the representations are attached at **Appendix D**.

Representations

- 2.13 Issues raised in the representations relate to the Prevention of Public Nuisance and Prevention of Crime and Disorder licensing objectives.
- 2.14 The main concerns relate to the level of noise already experienced by local residents and the potential for this to lead to disturbance later into the night. There is reference to noise from both the volume of music and from customers outside, particularly when using the rear balcony and when leaving the premises at the end of the night.
- 2.15 In addition, there are also concerns about anti-social behaviour from customers of the pub that are using the external seating area or while standing on the street outside the front of the building.
- 2.16 Several of the representations have highlighted that they have recently made complaints to Environmental Health regarding the level of noise they are experiencing from the pub. Environmental Health have liaised with the Applicant regarding the complaints received and their concerns about the potential nuisance which may result from the extended hours for licensable activities. The Applicant has agreed to include four additional conditions on the licence to promote the 'prevention of public nuisance' licensing objective. Environmental Health have confirmed that, subject to the inclusion of these additional conditions, they do not have an objection to the application. The agreed conditions are at **Appendix E**.
- 2.17 Any information contained in the representations which is not relevant to the promotion of the four licensing objectives (see 2.19) cannot be taken into consideration when determining the premises licence application.

Policy and Statutory Guidance

- 2.18 Section 3.1 of the Policy states: The Licensing Authority has a duty under the Act to carry out its licensing functions with a view to promoting the four licensing objectives.
- 2.19 The four licensing objectives are:
 - The prevention of crime and disorder
 - Public safety
 - The prevention of public nuisance

- The protection of children from harm
- 2.20 Section 3.2 of the Policy states: These objectives are the only matters to be taken into account in determining the application and any conditions attached must be appropriate to achieve the licensing objectives. Each objective is of equal importance. A licence will only be granted where the Licensing Authority is satisfied that these objectives have been met.
- 2.21 Section 2.4 of the Policy sets out additional legislation, strategies, policies and guidance to which the Licensing Authority will have regard.
- 2.22 The Guidance issued under Section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003 which was revised and re-published in December 2023 state: The Licensing Authority may not impose any conditions unless its discretion has been exercised following receipt of relevant representations and it is satisfied as a result of a hearing (unless all parties agree a hearing is not necessary) that it is appropriate to impose conditions to promote one or more of the four licensing objectives (paragraph 10.8 of the guidance).
- 2.23 The following responsible authorities are statutory consultees under the Licensing Act 2003:
 - Devon and Cornwall Police
 - Devon and Somerset Fire and Rescue Service
 - Devon Safeguarding Children's Board
 - Devon County Council Trading Standards
 - Devon Drug and Alcohol Action Team, NHS Devon
 - South Hams District Council Planning Department
 - South Hams District Council Environmental Health (Health & Safety)
 - South Hams District Council Environmental Health (Pollution Control) amendments agreed.
- 2.24 No representations have been received from responsible authorities. Four additional conditions have been agreed between the Applicant and Environmental Health.
- 2.25 In addition to the above responsible authorities, any person may make a representation in relation to a premises licence application.

3. Outcomes/outputs

- 3.1 When determining an application for a premises licence, particularly when considering appropriate conditions and operating hours, the following sections of the Statement of Licensing Policy (the policy) and Section 182 Guidance (the guidance) are especially relevant:
- 3.2 Where applications have given rise to representations, any appropriate conditions should normally focus on the most sensitive periods. For example, the most sensitive period for people being

disturbed by unreasonably loud music is at night and into the early morning when residents in adjacent properties may be attempting to go to sleep or are sleeping. This is why there is still a need for a licence for performances of live music between 11 pm and 8 am. In certain circumstances, conditions relating to noise immediately surrounding the premises may also prove appropriate to address any disturbance anticipated as customers enter and leave (paragraph 2.25 of the guidance).

- 3.3 Sections 5.5.1 and 5.5.2 of the policy states: The Licensing Authority will deal with the issue of licensing hours on the individual merits of each application, but the presumption will be to grant the hours requested unless there are relevant objections to those hours raised on the basis of the licensing objectives.
- 3.4 However, when issuing a licence with hours beyond midnight it is more likely that relevant representations will be made unless there are higher standards of control within operating schedules in order to promote the licensing objectives, especially for premises which are situated near residential areas or in areas where anti-social disorder takes place.
- 3.5 Section 5.5.5 of the policy states: The terminal hours will normally be approved where the Applicant can show that the proposal would not adversely affect the licensing objectives unless, after hearing relevant representation the Licensing Authority believe it appropriate to restrict the hours required due to the nature of the activities and the amenity of the area. If the Licensing Committee or a sub-committee believes that granting longer hours would undermine the licensing objectives, it may reject the application or grant it with appropriate conditions and/or different hours from those requested.
- 3.6 Section 3.8.1 of the Policy states: The Authority recognises the great variety of premises for which licences may be sought. These include theatres, members' clubs, sports clubs, cinemas, restaurants, pubs, nightclubs, cafes, takeaways, community halls, schools and off-licences. The Authority will not restrict access by children to any particular type of premises unless it is considered appropriate to do so in order to protect them from harm.
- 3.7 Section 3.8.6 of the Policy states: When deciding whether or not to limit access to children the Licensing Authority will judge each application on its own individual merits. Examples which may give rise to concern in respect of children would include premises:
 - where entertainment of an adult or sexual nature is provided
 - where there is a strong element of gambling taking place
 - with a known association with drug taking or dealing
 - where there have been convictions of the current management for serving alcohol to those under 18 years

- where the supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises is exclusive or primary purpose of the services provided at the premises
- □ where there are unsupervised areas (for example toilets, beer gardens, play zones).
- 3.8 The desired outcome is a determination of the application with reasons provided which relate to the four licensing objectives and when conditions are imposed, that these are appropriate to address the licensing objectives.

4. Options available and consideration of risk

- 4.1 The Licensing Authority may decide to impose additional conditions to address the four licensing objectives, or to amend or remove requested licensable activities. When coming to their decision the Licensing Sub-Committee must give consideration to the Section 182 Guidance and the Statement of Licensing Policy. Reasons must be given which relate to the licensing objectives for any decision made.
- 4.2 The Sub-Committee will need to consider the hours of operation proposed, the effectiveness of the operating schedule proposed by the applicant, the representations received, the location of the premises in relation to residential properties, the history of the management of the premises (if applicable), the evidence provided of any problems in the past, the likely impact of any extension of hours and activities, public transport, taxi availability, the right the applicant has to operate a business and balancing the rights of residents to the guiet enjoyment and privacy of family life. The South Hams relies on tourism, with the population in the district doubling in the summer months with holidaymakers both from this country and international visitors who are, in the main, families with young children and retired people - the very segment of society who would perhaps be deterred by anti-social behaviour. These, and any other relevant issues, may be explored at the hearing in so far as it reflects the four licensing objectives.
- 4.3 A decision made by the Licensing Sub-Committee may be appealed by the applicant or any person who has made relevant representations. The right of appeal is to the Magistrates' Court by virtue of Section 181 and Schedule 5 of the Licensing Act 2003. The Magistrates' Court may dismiss the appeal, or substitute its own decision, or send back the case to the Licensing Authority with directions as to how the case is to be dealt with. The Magistrates' Court may make any costs order it thinks fit.
- 4.4 The Licensing Act 2003 contains a provision which enables a responsible authority or any other person to apply to this Licensing Authority for a review of the premises licence once granted. A hearing follows which enables the Sub-Committee to use the

normal powers available, but also to suspend the licence for a period of up to three months or to withdraw it.

5. Proposed Way Forward

- 5.1 That the Sub-Committee consider the application for a new Premises Licence and make a determination in respect of this application, namely to:
 - (i) modify the conditions of the licence;
 - ii) to reject the whole or part of the application;

		The Act requires (Section 35) that in dealing with a variation to a premises licence application, the committee takes any of the following steps which are appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives: (i) modify the conditions of the licence; ii) to reject the whole or part of the application; The Sub-Committee must give its reasons for its decision to take any of these steps. Similarly, if

		the application is rejected, the Sub-Committee must give its reasons.
		The applicant or any person who has made relevant representations has the right to appeal a decision made by the Licensing Sub-Committee to the Magistrates' Court by virtue of Section 181 and Schedule 5 of Licensing Act 2003.
		On appeal, the Magistrates' Court may: a) dismiss the appeal; b) substitute for the decision appeal against another decision which could have been made by the Licensing authority; c) remit the case to the Licensing Authority to dispose of it in accordance with the direction of the court.

ANNEX 1- MANDATORY LICENSING CONDITIONS - Pubs, Clubs & Restaurants from 1st October 2014

SUPPLY OF ALCOHOL

No supply of alcohol may be made under the premises licence:-

- 1. at a time when there is no designated premises supervisor in respect of the premises licence, or
- 2. at a time when the designated premises supervisor does not hold a personal licence or his personal licence has been suspended.
- 3. Every supply of alcohol under the premises licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a personal licence.

REGISTERED DOOR STAFF

Each individual carrying out a 'security activity' must be licensed by the Security Industry Authority other than 1. in respect of premises within paragraph 8(3)(a) of Schedule 2 to the Private Security Industry Act 2001 (c.12) (premises with premises licences authorising plays or films), or

- 2. in respect of premises in relation to any occasion mentioned in paragraph 8(3)(b) or (c) of that Schedule (premises being used exclusively by club with club premises certificate, under a temporary event notice authorising plays or films or under a gaming licence), or
- 3. any occasion within paragraph 8(3)(d) of that Schedule (occasions prescribed by regulations under that Act).

For the purposes of this section

- "security activity" means an activity to which paragraph 2(1)(a) of that Schedule applies, and
- paragraph 8(5) of that Schedule (interpretation of references to an occasion) applies as it applies in relation to paragraph 8 of that Schedule.

MINIMUM PERMITTED PRICE FOR THE SALE OR SUPPY OF ALCOHOL

- 1. A relevant person shall ensure that no alcohol is sold or supplied for consumption on or off the premises for a price which is less than the permitted price.
- 2. For the purposes of the condition set out in paragraph 1—
- (a) "duty" is to be construed in accordance with the Alcoholic Liguor Duties Act 1979(a);
- (b) "permitted price" is the price found by applying the formula—
- $P = D + (D \times V)$

where—

- (i) P is the permitted price,
- (ii) D is the amount of duty chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the duty were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol, and
- (iii) V is the rate of value added tax chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the value added tax were

charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol;

- (c) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a premises licence—
- (i) the holder of the premises licence,
- (ii) the designated premises supervisor (if any) in respect of such a licence, or
- (iii) the personal licence holder who makes or authorises a supply of alcohol under such a licence;
- (d) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity which enables the member or officer to prevent the supply in question; and
- (e) "value added tax" means value added tax charged in accordance with the Value Added Tax Act 1994(b).
- 3. Where the permitted price given by Paragraph (b) of paragraph 2 would (apart from this paragraph) not be a whole number of pennies, the price given by that sub-paragraph shall be taken to be the price actually given by that sub-paragraph rounded up to the nearest penny.
- 4. (1) Sub-paragraph (2) applies where the permitted price given by Paragraph (b) of paragraph 2 on a day ("the first day") would be different from the permitted price on the next day ("the second day") as a result of a change to the rate of duty or value added tax.
- (2) The permitted price which would apply on the first day applies to sales or supplies of alcohol which take place before the expiry of the period of 14 days beginning on the second day.

IRRESPONSIBLE PROMOTIONS

- (1) The responsible person must ensure that staff on relevant premises do not carry out, arrange or participate in any irresponsible promotions in relation to the premises.
- (2) In this paragraph, an irresponsible promotion means any one or more of the following activities, or substantially similar activities, carried on for the purpose of encouraging the sale or supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises—
- (a) games or other activities which require or encourage, or are designed to require or encourage, individuals to—
- (i) drink a quantity of alcohol within a time limit (other than to drink alcohol sold or supplied on the premises before the cessation of the period in which the responsible person is authorised to sell or supply alcohol), or (ii) drink as much alcohol as possible (whether within a time limit or otherwise);
- (b) provision of unlimited or unspecified quantities of alcohol free or for a fixed or discounted fee to the public or to a group defined by a particular characteristic in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
- (c) provision of free or discounted alcohol or any other thing as a prize to encourage or reward the purchase and consumption of alcohol over a period of 24 hours or less in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
- (d) selling or supplying alcohol in association with promotional posters or flyers on, or in the vicinity of, the premises which can reasonably be considered to condone, encourage or glamorise anti-social behaviour or to refer to the effects of drunkenness in any favourable manner;
- (e) dispensing alcohol directly by one person into the mouth of another (other than where that other person is unable to drink without assistance by reason of disability).

POTABLE WATER

The responsible person must ensure that free potable water is provided on request to customers where it is reasonably available.

AGE VERIFICATION

- (1) The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder must ensure that an age verification policy is adopted in respect of the premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol.
- (2) The designated premises supervisor in relation to the premises licence must ensure that the supply of alcohol at the premises is carried on in accordance with the age verification policy.
- (3) The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and either—

- (a) a holographic mark, or
- (b) an ultraviolet feature.

MINIMUM MEASURES

The responsible person must ensure that—

- (a) where any of the following alcoholic drinks is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises (other than alcoholic drinks sold or supplied having been made up in advance ready for sale or supply in a securely closed container) it is available to customers in the following measures—
- (i) beer or cider: ½ pint;
- (ii) gin, rum, vodka or whisky: 25 ml or 35 ml; and
- (iii) still wine in a glass: 125 ml;
- (b) these measures are displayed in a menu, price list or other printed material which is available to customers on the premises; and
- (c) where a customer does not in relation to a sale of alcohol specify the quantity of alcohol to be sold, the customer is made aware that these measures are available.

EXHIBITION OF FILMS

The admission of children to the exhibition of any film to be restricted to:

- 1. Where the film classification body is specified in the licence, unless `subsection (2)(b) applies, admission of children must be restricted in accordance with any recommendation made by that body.
- 2. Where
- a) The film classification body is not specified in the licence, or
- b) The relevant licensing authority has notified the holder of the licence that this subsection applies to the film in question, admission of children must be restricted in accordance with any recommendation made by that licensing authority.
- 3. In this section

"children" means persons aged under 18; and

"film classification body" means the person or persons designated as the authority under section 4 of the Video Recordings Act 1984 (c.39) (authority to determine suitability of video works for classification).

ANNEX 2 - CONDITIONS CONSISTENT WITH THE OPERATING SCHEDULE

GENERAL

- 1. Staff training must incorporate:
- a) Responsible Alcohol Service, including recognising signs of drunkenness, refusal skills, drugs awareness,
- b) Premises Licence conditions
- 2. Training records must be signed by staff and retained on the premises for a period of 12 months. They must be produced for inspection when required by an Officer of a Responsible Authority.

PREVENTION OF CRIME AND DISORDER

- 3. CCTV must be installed and cover all internal areas, external trading area, including all public entry and exit points. The CCTV unit must be positioned in a secure part of the licensed premises and not within any private area of the location. Access to the system must be allowed immediately to the Police, Trading Standards or an authorised officer of the Licensing Authority in accordance with the Data Protection Act, where it is necessary to do so for the prevention of crime and disorder, prosecution or apprehension of offenders or where disclosure is required by law.
- 4. All images must be kept for a consecutive 31 day period and must be produced to the Police, Trading Standards or an authorised officer of the Licensing Authority in relation to the investigate of crime and/or disorder issues and suspected licence breaches, upon request or within 24 hours of such request where it is necessary to do so for the prevention of crime and disorder, prosecution or apprehension of offenders or where disclosure is required by law.

- 5. The CCTV system must be maintained so as to be fully operation and recording continually whilst the premises are open for licensable activities and during all times when customers remain on the premises.
- The CCTV system clock must be set correctly and maintained (taking account of GMT and BST).
- 7. There must be a member of staff available at all times who is trained and capable of operating the CCTV system and also downloading any footage required by the Police, Trading Standards or an authorised officer of the Licensing Authority.
- 8. A minimum of 2 SIA registered door supervisors must be on duty from 20:30 until close on a Friday and Saturday.
- 9. At all other times the Designated Premises Supervisor (DPS) must identify the requirement for door supervisors by way of a risk assessment, which must be made available for inspection by an authorised officer. Where the risk assessment identifies the need for door supervisors to be deployed, door supervisors must be sufficient in number to be able to control entry to the premises and deal with any instances of disorderly behaviour within the premises simultaneously. Door supervisors must remain at the premises until such time the premises are closed, and all members of the public have left the venue.
- 10. Where door supervisors are employed, there must be a register of every SIA person employed at the premises that contains the following details:
- a) Full name
- b) Security Industry Authority licence number
- c) Time and date each security staff starts and finishes duty
- d) Each entry must be signed by the door supervisors
- 11. That register must be kept fully updated at all times and remain at the licensed premises and be available for inspection immediately by an authorised officer of the Licensing Authority, the Security Industry Authority or Police.
- 12. An incident log (which may be kept electronically) must be kept at the premises and made available on request to the Police or an authorised officer of the Licensing Authority. It must be completed within 24 hours of the incident and must record the following:
- a) All crimes reported to the premises
- b) All ejections of patrons
- c) Any complaints received concerning crime and disorder
- d) Any incidents of disorder
- e) All seizures of drugs or offensive weapons
- f) Where possible, details of those involved including members of the public, police officers, SIA staff and employees
- 13. A refusals register (which may be kept electronically) must be held at the premises and contain details of the time and date of any sales that are refused in relation to persons that are underage. This register must be made available for inspection upon request by a Responsible Authority.

PUBLIC SAFETY

14. The Premises Licence Holder must be aware of relevant legislation and take any responsibilities seriously.

PREVENTION OF PUBLIC NUISANCE

- 15. Outside areas must be monitored and regularly cleared of glasses and bottles.
- 16. The outside areas must not be used beyond 23:00hrs save for persons temporarily permitted to smoke.
- 17. Persons must not be allowed to leave the premises (except to any area set aside for the consumption of alcohol) with open containers of drinks of any kind.

- 18. All doors (save for access or egress) and windows must be kept shut during regulated entertainment.
- Notices must be prominently displayed near all exits from the premises requesting patrons to leave quietly with consideration for neighbours.

PROTECTION OF CHILDREN FROM HARM

- 20. Challenge 25 must be operated at the premises whereby all persons who appear to be under 25 years of age and purchasing or attempting to purchase alcohol must be asked to provide identification to prove they are over 18 years of age. The only acceptable forms of identification allowed are:
- a) A valid passport
- b) A valid photo ID driving licence, or
- c) A valid proof of age scheme card with the PASS approved hologram
- 21. Challenge 25 signage must be displayed in a clear and prominent public place at the premises.
- 22. All staff must be fully trained in relation to the Challenge 25 scheme before being allowed to sell alcohol and a record must be kept of staff training.





REPRESENTATION - 1 received Saturday 15 June 2024 PART I

> I am a resident [**REDACTED**] The Exchange, 1 Fore Street, Ivybridge. I'm writing to raise an objection to the application to vary their Premises Licence on the grounds of recent increased noise and ASB from this premises.

>

> Over the last 3 weeks this business, on Friday and Saturday nights, have been hosting live music and what sounds like kareoke nights with antisocial levels of noise between 10pm and midnight.

>

> The impact of this has been disruptive to our households rest and wellbeing and causing an unacceptable level of anxiety.

>

> I have lived in this house for 37 years in the vicinity of this public house and have never experienced this level of noise and disruption. I have logged a complaint with you on 5 occasions to date and there is further live music advertised tonight.

>

> It is clear that the current management have no regard for the residents in this area. I'm concerned now to see that they are effectively applying for a late drinks licence for every day of the week up to midnight and up to 1am Friday and Saturday. This is not reasonable or acceptable in a residential area and particularly in light of their inability to maintain reasonable noise levels.

>

> Please can I have a response to this representation and my previous complaint. I'd like to know how residents needs are being considered.

REPRESENTATION 1 - received 26 June 2024 PART II

Secondly, I have registered my complaint with South Hams Council in relation to following dates where we have suffered significant disturbance:

Fri 31 May between 22:00 -23:59

Sat 1 June between 22:00-23:59

Fri 7 June between 22:00-23:59

Sat 8 June between 22:00-2359

Fri 14 June between 22:00-23:59

On each occasion music and singing was at a level causing disturbance to sleep/rest within my home with doors and windows closed.

Finally, their denial of any wrongdoing itself evidences a lack of respect and responsibility and should be considered when assessing further extension to licence or indeed any further late entertainment/licence. Previous management have managed to operate in a way that was acceptable to residents during the last 30 years+ I have lived here. This corporate business does not appear to consider the community over its profits.

REPRESENTATION 1 - received 07 July 2024 PART III

Dear Harry, I have sent the following to the environmental health to report further noise nuisance. This further highlights that this company are not interested in managing their business in a responsible manner. I'm also becoming increasingly concerned about levels of visible alcohol consumption through the day in the outside area. This feels inconsistent with public health priorities and we also have school children passing this pub on their way to and from school. If as requested they obtain a licence from 8am daily this is likely to encourage what is effectively street drinking, even if they stick inside their outside smoking/drinking area, all day.

I would like to update my complaint to include evidence of the Exchange pub allowing drinking outside the premises in the street (see attached photo from Saturday 6th July at 20:30). You will see from the attached photo that security staff are present and allowing people to consume alcohol outside of the fenced area. This results in increased noise levels and intimidating behaviours to some in our community and is anti social.

This is further evidence that this company have little interest in operating in a manner that is responsible and mindful of the wider community.



REPRESENTATION - 2 received 17 June 2024 PART I

Good morning

I would like to objection for the pub to be opening extra hours. They have been open extra hours over the past months. I have first hand of this. When people leaving the venue making to much noise even the bounces that weekend don't tell the to leave quietly. They are playing music so loud it sounds like I'm living in a night club. The bands karaoke party nights in the extension there is no soundproofing so it comes through my property. Police have been called a number of times for trouble at the pub. The weekend party starts from Wednesday nights Thursday nights it's open mic and karaoke Friday night party night Sat live band Sun open mic karaoke or a band. My walls are vibrating.so on this note I think the pub is out of line doing all this it is a residential area you couldn't even play loud music in your house after 11 o'clock? Why should a pub be encouraging this?

This pub from wedn till sun is loud. Friday Saturday night the party goes on till 1am this has been for a months now. Sounds like a night club on a Friday a Saturday a some times on a Sunday. Thursday evening open mic night a karaoke Friday party night sat night live music sun is karaoke live music or open mic. When people is leaving the pub there a lot of noise out in the street the pub is in a residential area. This pub needs lookin in to. I rang up on Monday and told me that the pub should close at 0000 Monday till Sunday but when u look it up it says 1am Friday sat night a sure Sunday night open later then 12 . There is drinkin going on after hours to. I have walked pass an seen. Thanks

REPRESENTATION - 2 received 18 June 2024 PART II

Thank you for the e mail back. Well I know first hand on Friday an Saturday night the bands are playing gone 12:30/1245 this has been happening for the last 5 months. Wednesday a Thursday nights it does stop early. I'm away this weekend but from now on I will report it every night this happens when people are leving the pub at 1am in the morning it's so lould as well. Plus last night I did report it to them as well.

REPRESENTATION - 3 received 25 June 2024

I am writing to object to the licensing application for this pub to open even later than the current time.

We live [REDACTED] and we have had many issues with music noise, fighting and foul language which has left us unable to sleep before midnight over the weekend. We are currently completing a noise pollution diary.

I believe that there are many other people who are experiencing these same issues and they are also objecting to this proposal.

In fact, due to significant environment changes since the licence was last properly reviewed, I believe the closing times should be brought earlier than current. These changes are due to all the trees in between the pub and our property having been washed away and therefore loosing the natural sound barrier between the rear of the pub and our property. This has made the issues significantly worse in what is a residential area.

A start point in dealing with this would be for the pub to lock the rear doors so people cannot smoke, fight or shout on the balcony at the rear. The rear doors should only be used as a fire escape.

Again, this is a residential area where people need to be allowed to sleep after 11pm.

REPRESENTATION - 4 received 27 June 2024

I noticed that the Exchange pub has applied to extending their opening hours. We live [REDACTED] and have had to accept that there has to be some disruption and noise issues. However, I have never complained before. For the point of clarification, does the extended opening mean that very loud music will be played until 01.00on Friday and Saturday and until 12.00 the rest of the week? Or does it mean that the extra hour is for drinking only?

We are also aware that on the balcony at the rear of the premises will be in use to allow drinkers to occupy and make a very loud amount of noise? For many reasons we have to accept what we have at present. However, an extension is unacceptable in what is also a residential area.

REPRESENTATION - 5 received 08 July 2024

Dear Licensing Committee

I am writing in response to the proposed variation to licensing hours for The Exchange, Fore Street, Ivybridge. Recent notice has been given that they are requesting to extend hours for licensing activities from 8am to midnight Sunday to Thursday and 8am-1am Friday and Saturday. I oppose this request and ask that the licensing committee consider the following:

1. Reason for the request:

Without a clear and transparent rationale for this request, there is no reason to permit this considerable increase in hours. I served as a Plymouth magistrate for a number of years, during which time I sat occasionally on the licensing committee. All requests for extensions to licensing hours had to be clearly explained and were only granted in special circumstances such as wedding anniversaries or milestone birthdays. I appreciate there have been changes to licensing laws since then, but there still needs to be an acceptable answer to the question of why does this establishment need these extended hours, particularly as they are on a regular basis, not a one-off special occasion. In addition, I question who benefits from this extension of licensing hours. It appears the request is solely to benefit financial profit for a corporate business (Craft Union Pub Company Ltd) and not to serve the needs of the residents of lvybridge. This is not a good reason to permit the proposed activity.

2. The development of lyybridge as a town and community:

The current lvybridge Neighbourhood Plan sets out the requirement for development to contribute to a healthy, creative and sustainable town, supported by South Hams aspiring to being a 'place to thrive'. The majority of people want their hometowns to be places they can feel safe and enjoy a good quality of life. Current statistics in England indicate 40% of crime is related to alcohol use and alcohol is implicated in higher incidences of domestic abuse and

anti-social behaviour. At a time when Devon and Cornwall police priority is the reduction in anti-social behaviour, the granting of this request for extended licensing hours would run counter to everything that supports the building of lyybridge as a place people can feel safe, thrive and enjoy a good quality of life.

Two brief examples from past seven days are that I have walked past the Exchange on a weekday afternoon and witnessed a very loud argument, with foul and aggressive language, between a group of women drinking in the outdoor seating area. This was at a time when people were going about their daily business in shops and children were going home from school. Further, I came home at 8.30pm yesterday to see a large group of mostly young men drinking on the street outside the pub, not within the designated outdoor drinking area. The ways children and young people witness adult behaviour is a very important part of their experience of the world and our future communities. I strongly oppose additional opportunities for children to witness this type of anti-social conduct as 'normal'.

3. Management of the impact on local area by this establishment:

Further to my point above, and on a more personal note, I have had to move out of my bedroom for five consecutive Friday and Saturday nights in May/June, due to noise coming from music in the Exchange and now can no longer sleep there when I know there is a licence for live music until midnight. I went down to investigate at 11.20pm on the first Saturday and spoke to the security staff. They told me the establishment had a licence until midnight. I raised my concern that the volume of the music was too loud and the doors were wide open, hence a local noise disturbance that had stopped me from sleeping. If the management of the establishment are unable to anticipate the need for a simple adjustment (i.e. turn it down after 11 and keep the doors shut) to minimise the impact of noise, I don't believe there is any evidence they can be responsible with further extension to licence. The impression I had from the brief conversation with security staff was that the approving of a licence gives an establishment permission to do what they want.

I am a resident [**REDACTED**], in close proximity to the Exchange, where I have lived since 1987. Throughout that time the Exchange has operated as a pub, so I'm familiar with the expected noise levels and some anti-social behaviour occasionally around 11pm. I have never made any complaint and nor have I ever had to move out of my bedroom to sleep elsewhere. This past couple of months has been unprecedented levels of noise and so I oppose this establishment being given the opportunity to extend it further.

In general I oppose this request as I don't think it fits with the direction Ivybridge wants to develop. It will contribute further to anti-social behaviour and unhealthy lifestyles and there is no evidence that an all day drinking establishment similar to a Wetherspoons model is necessary in this town. In particular, I oppose this request because I don't believe this establishment has shown itself responsible and considerate enough to attend to any issues that might arise. I ask that the committee take these points into consideration when making their decision and give a clear message that they prioritise the people they serve and are committed to the development of Ivybridge as a safe, healthy, town where people are happy to live and can thrive.

APPENDIX E – Additional conditions agreed between Applicant and Environmental Health

The Applicant has agreed to include the following conditions on their premises licence to promote 'The Prevention of Public Nuisance' licensing objective, as requested by Environmental Health.

Environmental Health confirmed that they would not submit a representation to the application, subject to these conditions being included.

Additional conditions:

- 1. Noise and vibration shall be managed in such a way as to ensure that they do not cause persons in the neighbourhood to be unreasonably disturbed.
- 2. The entrance/exit door(s) shall be fitted with automatic door-closers that are maintained in good working order to minimise noise break out from the premises.
- 3. Staff shall check that self-closing doors are not wedged open during regulated entertainment.
- 4. A suitable Noise Management Plan, submitted to and approved by the Local Authority, shall be implemented. It must demonstrate the measures taken to control noise breakout from the premises during live and recorded music.

It is requested that if the variation application is granted, that the above conditions are included in the decision.
